Reginald Maurice Akers was born on February 21, 1940, to the union of John M. Akers, Sr. and Blanche V. Akers, in Des Moines, Iowa. He was the first of eleven children born to this union. They moved to New Haven, Michigan, when Reggie was very young. He attended New Haven Community Schools, and played all competitive sports and was a 4-letter man, in those sports. He attended the Greater New Hope Baptist Church, while growing up in New Haven.

“Reggie” as he was affectionately called, served in the United States Air Force for twelve years, earning an honorable discharge. While serving in the Air Force, he became a Major Communications Operator. His various tours included; Athens, Greece, and Tripoli, Africa. Reggie worked for General Motors, as a heavy duty press operator, at the General Motors Stamping Plant 15, in Pontiac, Michigan, for over 30 years, where he retired in 2006. Reggie loved to hunt wild game and fish from his personal boat, or on land, he loved the outdoors life.
